### SUGGESTED STEPS FOR ADDRESSING YOUR BEAVER PROBLEM

- Contact New Marlborough Board of Health and discuss perceived problem.
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- Attend site visit with New Marlborough Board of Health Agent to determine if an emergency threat to health and safety exists (See attached list). If our department makes a negative determination, you may appeal to the Director of Fisheries and Wildlife.
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- Begin discussion with neighbors and/or abutters, if involved. You will need signed consent forms ( provided by the New Marlborough Board of Health) from all property owners affected. You can obtain ownership information from the Assessors' Office at the Town Hall.
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- Fill out Application for Beaver Removal Permit Application from Board of Health.
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- Contact Certified State and Licensed Trapper to perform animal removal. The trapper must sign a copy of the Permit at our office before Permit is issued.
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- **Contact a reputable company who specializes in the installation of water level control devices and work with them to devise a long-term solution. If an existing beaver population is trapped out, others will move in to prime habitat areas after one or two breeding seasons. Properly monitored and maintained water-level control devices are the preferred long-term solution. All work near or in a wetland or any alteration to beaver structures must be permitted by the Conservation Commission in your Town and the professional you hire to perform such work should be familiar with the permitting process.**

Under this emergency permit, the following list constitutes a threat to human health and safety.

- (a) beaver or muskrat occupancy of a public water supply
- (b) beaver or muskrat caused flooding of drinking water wells, well fields or water pumping stations
- (c) beaver or muskrat caused flooding of sewage beds, septic systems or sewage pumping stations
- (d) beaver or muskrat caused flooding of public or private way, driveway, railway, or airport runway or taxiway
- (e) beaver or muskrat caused flooding of electrical or gas generation plants, or transmission or distribution structures or facilities, telephone or other communication facilities or other public utilities
- (f) beaver or muskrat caused flooding affecting the public use of hospitals, emergency clinics, nursing homes, homes for the elderly or fire stations;
- (g) beaver or muskrat caused flooding affecting hazardous waste sites or facilities, incineration or resource recovery plants or other structures or facilities whereby flooding may result in the release or escape of hazardous or noxious materials or substances;
- (h) the gnawing, chewing, entering or damage to electrical or gas generation transmission or distribution equipment, cables, alarm systems or facilities by any beaver or muskrat
- (i) beaver or muskrat caused flooding or structural instability on property owned by the applicant if such animal problem poses an imminent threat of substantial property damage or income loss, which shall be limited to: (1) flooding of residential, commercial, industrial or commercial buildings or facilities; (2) flooding of or access to commercial agricultural lands which prevents normal agricultural practices from being conducted on such lands; (3) reduction in the production of an agricultural crop caused by flooding or compromised structural stability of commercial agricultural lands; (4) flooding of residential lands in which the municipal board of health, its chair or agent or the state or federal department of health has determined a threat to human health and safety exists.

Under M.G.L. c. 131, s. 80A, an emergency permit authorizes the applicant or his duly authorized agent to immediately remedy the threat to human health and safety by one or more of the following options: (a) the use of conibear or box or cage-type traps for the taking of beaver or muskrat, subject to regulations; (b) the breaching of dams, dikes, bogs or berms; and/or (c) employing any non-lethal management of water-flow devices. The emergency permit will be good for 10 days from the date of issue.

In accordance with and pursuant to provisions contained in chapter 131 of the Massachusetts General Laws section 40, 80A and 321 Code of Massachusetts Regulation 2.08 and 10.00 (Wetlands Protection Act), the permittee(s) above named may immediately remedy the threat to human health and safety by one or more of the following options:

- (a) the use of conibear or box or cage-type traps for the taking of beaver or muskrat, subject to the regulations promulgated by the Division of Fisheries and Wildlife (see back)
- (b) the breaching of dams, dikes, bogs or berms, so-called\*
- (c) employing any non-lethal management or water-flow devices\*

\*If the permittee chooses option(s) b and/or c, he/she must appear before the local conservation commission to obtain an emergency certification regarding specifications for breach size and/or water-flow device installation in accordance to M.G.L. c. 131, s. 40 (Wetlands Protection Act).

The Board of Health has determined that said beaver or muskrat problem poses a threat to public health and safety as stated in M.G.L. c.131, s.80A.

This permit or a copy thereof shall be carried on the person of any individual exercising the authority thereof and shall be shown upon request if challenged by any local or state law enforcement officer empowered to enforce the provisions of M.G.L. c. 131.

#### Massachusetts Division of Fisheries and Wildlife trapping regulations

*Permittee(s) may destroy problem furbearing mammals (named above) by means of a body gripping trap or by means of a box or cage type trap including Hancock or Bailey traps for catching beaver. The pan of Hancock and Bailey traps must be submerged in water. Problem furbearing mammals that are captured alive shall be disposed of by destruction in a humane manner. Body gripping traps with a jaw spread not less than 4 inches and not greater than 7 inches or body gripping traps with a jaw spread not less than 6 inches and not exceeding 10 inches for the trapping of beaver only, may be used if such traps are completely submerged in water. The placement of traps in reference to the proximity of the beaver lodge or beaver dam is unrestricted, but the disturbance or destruction of the beaver lodge or beaver dam is strictly prohibited unless otherwise authorized.*

*Permittee(s) taking problem furbearing mammals, on the property of another, by means of a trap shall possess a valid Massachusetts trapping license and traps shall be registered according to M.G.L. c. 131, s. 80.*

*Said problem furbearing mammals (named above), their carcasses or parts thereof may be retained by the permittee, sold, bartered, or exchanged for consideration during the open regulated harvest season for that species. Sealing of beaver pelts is required. Disposition of all carcasses obtained from the incidental capture of furbearing mammals not authorized by this permit must be surrendered to the District Wildlife Manager of the Division of Fisheries and Wildlife having jurisdiction in the town where the furbearing mammal was taken.*
